Eisenhower Inauguration

One of the delights of going to school in the 1950's was playing in the band at the Gettysburg Area School System. For a very small fortunate group of students, we played many times for the President of the United States Dwight D. Eisenhower. The President and First Lady (Mamie Eisenhower) had purchased a farm at Gettysburg in 1950. Captain Eisenhower had been stationed at Gettysburg in 1918 training the U.S. Army Tank Corps. He and Mamie fell in love with the local community that included the Battlefield. When Eisenhower was elected to the White House in 1952, he and his wife continued to visit the farm as often as they could. The Senior High School Band always greeted them as they would stop at the Square and greet hundreds of Gettysburg students. This greeting usually took place on a Friday. Schools closed many times and the students were escorted to the Square to wait for the President and First Lady to arrive. Band and students pictures were featured in national magazines and newspapers many times during the Eisenhower presidential years.

In 1956, President Eisenhower won a landslide victory in his re-election. He insisted the Gettysburg school band march in his 2nd inauguration parade on January 20, 1957. The director of the band was Robert Zeigler who went to work organizing the band trip to Washington, D.C. Coaches were reserved for the band members which numbered



seventy-five strong. We loaded the buses very early in the morning on January 20th and headed for Washington. Mr. Zeigler had warned all of us to dress warmly because temperatures were in the low 20's for the parade. Many members wore two pairs of long underwear and still froze. The parade was very long. As the band marched by the Presidential reviewing stand, we all looked out the corner of our eyes to get a glimpse of the Eisenhowers. As I looked at the President, I noticed he stood up and saluted us as we passed the stand. What a moment in the life of a 9th grader. It is a moment and event no members of the band ever forgot. Gettysburg High School's band became one of two Pennsylvania high school bands to ever march in a presidential inauguration.

PROGRAM NOTES

The Star Spangled Banner-Jack Stamp

This version of the National Anthem called "A love song to our country" by Jack Stamp was written in 1986 for Michigan State University Wind Ensemble. It was published shortly after the September 11, 2001 attacks on the United States when the arranger was asked if he still had the composition by a college band director who had performed the work while as a member of the MSU Wind Ensemble.

In All Its Glory-James Swearingen

"IN ALL ITS GLORY" marks the second consecutive work which composer James Swearingen has had premiered at the annual meeting of the Ohio Music Educators Association. In February of 1989 this composition was dedicated and performed by the Worthington Civic Band under the direction of Elaine Ostrander. The title serves as a reflection of the City of Worthington, Ohio. Founded in 1803, this Columbus suburb is rich in historic tradition and has always maintained a strong sense of community pride.

Chorale and Shaker Dance-John P. Zdechlik

CHORALE AND SHAKER DANCE is made up of two main musical ideas. The first is the simple melody found in the opening Chorale. The second melodic idea is the melody from the well known Shaker Hymn, "The Gift To Be Simple." These melodies are used in alteration and combination throughout the piece divided into four broad sections. The work was commissioned by the Jefferson High School Band of Bloomington, Minnesota.

PROGRAM NOTES

The Fire of Eternal Glory-Dmitri Shostakovich/transcribed by Timothy Rhea

THE FIRE OF ETERNAL GLORY was written in 1960 by Russian composer Dmitri Shostakovich for the opening of the War Memorial in the city of Novorossiisk. The music is a celebration of the defenders of the city during the Bolshevik Revolution. Shostakovich said of his orchestral work, "The music is at first heroic, with a tinge of sorrow, but gradually becomes elated and loses its darkness." This transcription was written for the Texas A&M University Symphonic Band.

Space Symphony-Julie Giroux

Julie Giroux composed SPACE SYMPHONY in 1991. Although a program piece, the work does not tell a story, but does contain imagery of being in outer space. It is organized in four movements much like a symphony from the Classical period. The work was commissioned by the Northwestern State University Concert Band in Natchitoches, Louisiana.

Gershwin!-Warren Barker

This work was arranged in 1997 and features some of the American composer, George Gershwin's most well known songs. The work includes Fascinating Rhythm (1924), Embraceable You (1930), Somebody Loves Me (1924), Someone To Watch Over Me (1926), and I Got Rhythm (1930). These Gershwin songs would have been popular at the time when the Gettysburg Area High School Band was being founded.

The Blue and The Gray-Clare Grundman

Clare Grundman composed THE BLUE AND THE GRAY in 1961. The work contains the Civil War Songs: "Kingdom Coming," "Marching Through Georgia," "Tenting Tonight," "The Yellow Rose of Texas," "The Bonnie Blue Flag," "Aura Lee," "Dixie," "Battle Cry of Freedom," and "Battle Hymn of the Republic." This piece was performed by the Gettysburg Area High School Band on April 29, 1979, under the direction of Mr. Parcels when the band celebrated its 50th Year.

"The Promise of Living" from The Tender Land-Aaron Copland, transcribed by Kenneth Singleton

Aaron Copland's only full-length opera, *The Tender Land*, was begun in 1952 and completed in 1954, with a libretto by Erick Johns. Although containing some of Copland's most lyrical music, the opera took time establishing its place in the repertoire. In 1958, Copland extracted a three-movement orchestral suite from the opera. The composer conducted the first performance of the Suite in April 1959 with the Boston Symphony Orchestra, and he later recalled: "the reviews were far better than they had been for the opera." The final movement of the suite, *The Promise of Living*, is based on the folk tune "Zion's Walls." This transcription for band was made in September 1998 for the Cheyenne Mountain (CO) High School Symphonic Band.

The Stars and Stripes Forever-John Phillip Sousa

American composer John Phillip Sousa wrote the official march of the United States of America, THE STARS AND STRIPES FOREVER, on Christmas Day in 1896. The piece received recognition as the National March by Congress in 1987, the year of the Bicentennial of US Constitution. This work was also performed in the 1979 celebration of the 50th year of the Gettysburg Area High School Band.

BENJAMIN L. JONES BAND LEADERSHIP AWARD

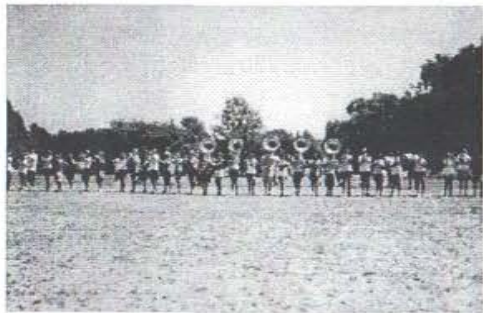

HISTORY OF THE GETTYSBURG AREA HIGH SCHOOL BAND

1928-1929 to 2003-2004

- 1928 -29 School year** – The band is formed – Prof. Harry Stenger Director
- 1931-** Mr. Edwin S. Longanecker joins faculty to teach English and direct the Band
- 1932-** The band gets its first girl member and new uniforms
- 1934-** The band participates in the National Forensic Leagues Band Contest
- 1938-** 75th Anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg. President Roosevelt visits Gettysburg. Band is in Anniversary Parade.
- 1942** -The first complete uniform is purchased for the band members
- 1944 - 45** Band performs for the first time in Hunterstown Memorial Day Parade and Ceremonies
- 1951-** Mr. Robert G. Zeigler joins faculty as first full time band director. Band performs in State Elks Convention Parade in Williamsport.
- 1952-** Booster Club formed, new uniforms purchased, Arion Award presented for first time. Band participates in Gettysburg College Band Day
- 1953-** Band receives trophy and excellent rating in Harrisburg Marching Contest
- 1954-** Gettysburg hosts Southern District Band
- 1955-** Band participates in welcoming Pres. Eisenhower to Gettysburg
- 1956-** Band marches in Pres. Eisenhower's Inaugural Parade, Gettysburg College Commencement Exercises, Dedication of the U.S. Army Reserve Center.
- 1963-** 100th Anniversary of Lincoln's Gettysburg Address.
- 1964-** Mr. Roger L. Parsels becomes Band's Director, band participates in State Lions Club Parade.
- 1965-** Band travels to New York, plays at Worlds Fair, plays at Eisenhower Farm and participates in dedication of monument to "The Soldiers and Sailors of the Confederacy."
- 1966-** First Exchange Concert – with West York H.S. Band
- 1967-** Band participates in Gov. Shafer's Inaugural Parade, Gettysburg College Music Festival and the Elks State Convention Parade.
- 1968-** Robert Nagal performs with band on Spring Concert, exchange concert is with Bloomfield, New Jersey, High School.
- 1969-** Exchange concert with binghamton Central High School (New York) Band.
- 1970-** Exchange concert with Ithaca, New York, High School.
- 1971-** Band participates in Indianapolis Memorial Day Parade and Pre-Race Parade of Bands at Indy "500", also, Gov. Shapp's Inaugural Parade, new uniforms.
- 1972-** Gettysburg hosts Southern District PMEA Adjudication Festival.
- 1973-** Exchange with Pompton Plains, New Jersey, High School.

- 1974-** Exchange with Skaneateles, New York, High School, band received "excellent" rating at Southern District PMEA Adjudication Festival at Waynesboro.
- 1975-** Band participates in Gov. Shapp's Inaugural Parade and "Almost Anything Goes" exchange concert with Lexington, Virginia, High School.
- 1976-** Exchange concert with Maryville High School, Cheektowaga, New York.
- 1977-** Exchange concert with Lawrence High School, Cedarhurst, New York
- 1978-** Exchange concert with Northeastern High School, Elizabeth City, N. Carolina.
- 1981-** Mr. Jones becomes the high school band director.
- 1982-** Ceremonial Brass Band started.
- 1983-** The Band performs in the Azalea Festival in Norfolk, VA.
- 1986-1987-** Magic Music Days in Orlando over Thanksgiving
- 1989-** National Cherry Blossom Parade, Washington DC.
- 1990-** Citrus Bowl Parade in Orlando FL, Main Street Parade at Walt Disney World
- 1991-** The Band performs at the Parade of Champions at James Madison University
- 1992-93-** Mr. Parsels retires from the GASD, Mr. Jones moves Elementary Band
- 1993-** Jami Jennings Verderosa becomes the seventh band director, the band receives new uniforms
- 94-95 Spring of 1995-** The Band performs in the Magic Music Days at Walt Disney World in Orlando.
- 1995-** The Band hosts the 250 member West Chester University Marching Band at a home football game.
- 96-97-** The Ceremonial Brass Band performs in the London New Years Day Parade.
- 1998-** Mrs. Verderosa leaves and Mr. Jones returns to the high school.
- 98-99-** The Band performs in the PA Firemen's Parade in Gettysburg and travels to Florida to perform in the Gator Bowl and Parade, and performed at Walt Disney World.
- 2001-2002-** Hosted the PMEA Lower District 7 Band Festival with Dr. Mark Heidel as Guest Conductor
- 2002-03-** The Band performed in the Gator Bowl and Parade. Mr. Jones retires.
- 2003-04-** Matthew Alosi becomes the 8th Band Director. The band celebrates its 75th year.



Gettysburg Area High School Past Directors

Professor Harry C. Stenger - founder - Gettysburg High School Band 1928-29

Pref. Stenger was born and raised in Mercersburg, PA. After moving to Hanover around 1925, he was prevailed upon to organize a high school band which he did. He had musical organizations in most towns surrounding Hanover and was busy everyday and most nights of the week. He not only had a number of school bands but youth and adult bands as well and the St. Marks Lutheran Church (Hanover) Sunday School Orchestra. Among the organizations that Stenger organized and/or directed were The Tressler Orphans Home Band at Loysville, The Hanover High School Band, The Hanover P.O.S. of A. Band, The Jefferson Band, The Wayne Band, The East Berlin Band, The Gettysburg Boys Band and The Gettysburg High School Band.

Edwin S. Longanecker - 1931-1951

Mr. Longanecker is a graduate of Shippensburg University and Duke University. He also earned graduate credits at the University of West Virginia and the Ithaca Military Band School. A teacher of Music, English and History, he began his career at Shady Springs High School in Glen Hedrich, West Virginia. He came to Gettysburg in 1931 to teach English and Instrumental Music. He "retired" from the band in 1951 but continued as an 11th grade English Teacher until his retirement in 1970. In addition to his directorship of the Gettysburg High School Band, Mr. Longanecker worked with the Littlestown Citizens Band, The Gettysburg Blue and Gray Band, The Lyric Band of Hanover and the St. James Church Sunday School Orchestra.

Robert G. Zeigler - 1951-1961

Mr. Zeigler was born in York County and graduated from Dallastown High School. Membership in his Sunday School Orchestra and the Yoe Band were early musical interests. Upon completion of B.S. Degree requirements at West Chester University, he spent three years in the military serving with the engineers in the China-Burma-India Theater. Following this, he completed Masters Degree Requirements at Temple University. Prior to coming to Gettysburg in 1951 he taught instrumental and vocal music - grades 1-12 - in the New Freedom-Glen Rock School System. He is a former President of the Penna. Bandmasters Association and the Adams County Community Concert Association.

Kenneth C. Hays - 1961-64

Born in Chambersburg, PA., Mr. Hays is a graduate of Lebanon Valley College with his graduate degree from Ithaca College. In addition, he has studied at Westminster Choir College, Temple University and Shippensburg University. Following his three years in the Gettysburg School system, he taught in the Camp Hill School District. In 1967, he was hired in the Cumberland Valley School District and later was appointed full-time Supervisor of Music, grades K-12. Mr. Hays retired in 1999 after 38 years of working in public education.

Mr. Parsels was born and raised in Ithaca, New York. He is a graduate, both Bachelor and Masters degrees, of Ithaca College. In addition he earned credits in Sacred Music at Nyack, New York, College. Prior to coming to Gettysburg, he taught at Franklin Academy and Prattsburg Central School in Prattsburg, N.Y., and in the Lansford, PA., School District. In addition to directing the Gettysburg High School Band, Mr. Parsels directs the Prince of Peace Episcopal Church Choir. He is also a wildlife artist.

Benjamin L. Jones- 1981-1993, 1998-2003

Mr. Jones, a graduate of Chambersburg High School, taught 28 years in the Gettysburg Area School District. After starting at the Junior High, Mr. Jones was the band director at Gettysburg Area High School from 1979 to 1993, at which point he took an assignment teaching elementary band. In 1998, he returned to the high school position which he held until his retirement in the Spring of 2003. Mr. Jones has a BS in Music Education from Susquehanna University, a Master of Music Education from the Pennsylvania State University and his Supervisory and Principal certificate from Western Maryland College. Prior to his appointment to Gettysburg, Mr. Jones was the band director at Biglerville High School for seven years. Mr. Jones plays tuba with the Gettysburg Brassworks and directs "a Gettysburg Brass Band."

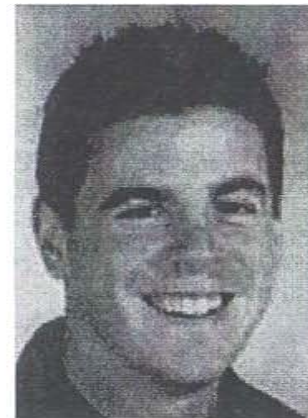
Jami Jennings Verderosa-1993-1998

In addition to his duties at Gettysburg, Mr. Alosi has been the drill designer and band consultant for the Shippensburg University Marching Band since 2000.

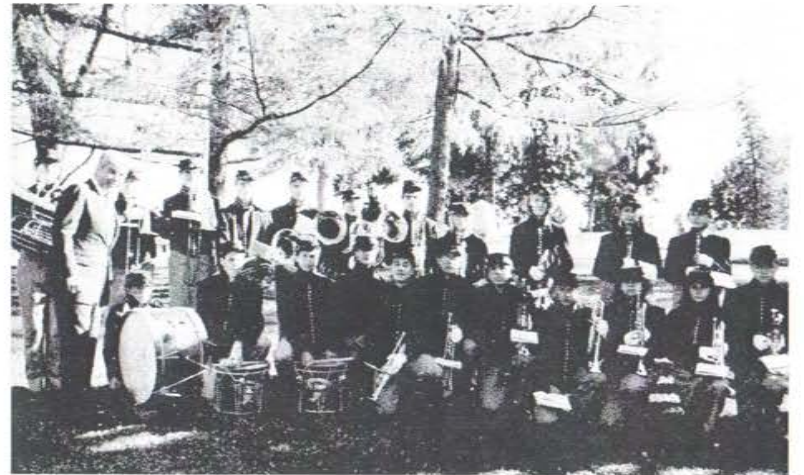
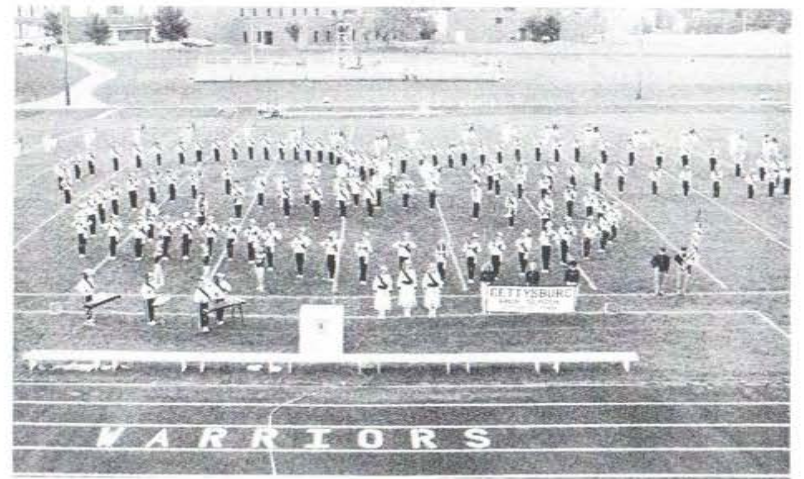
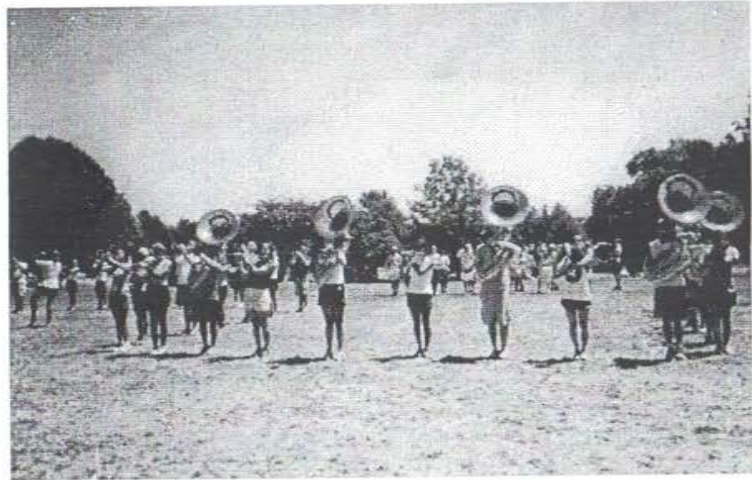
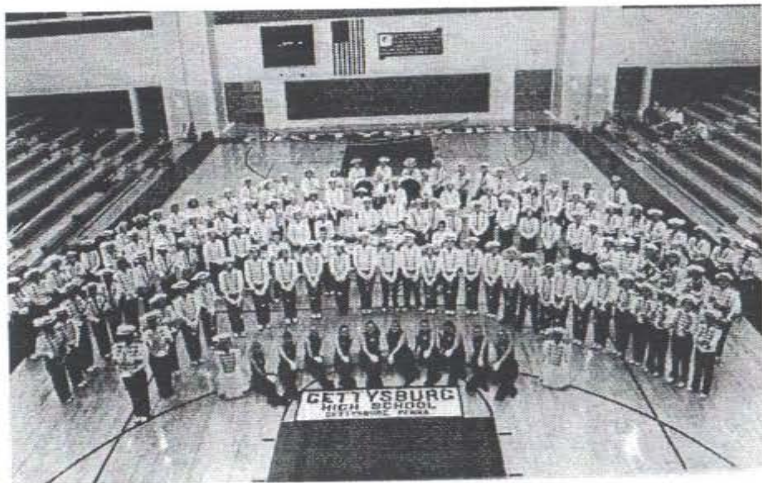
